FACTS

* Almost every piece of plastic ever made still exists today!

 It takes around 450 years for one plastic bottle to break down into the ground

*Over 4 million plastic bottles are used by Americans every hour!

*The U.S. annually produces over 9 billion plastic bottles. Around two thirds end up in landfills or incinerators.

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Why phase out plastics?

The University of Texas system and The University of Texas at Dallas have placed an emphasis on sustainability efforts throughout their history, specifically from a waste reduction perspective. Because single-use plastics bans are becoming widespread across other campuses, such a ban is a logical **next step for UT Dallas**, a campus that wants to remain a leader in the sustainability field.

Institutions classified as "aspirational peers" of UTD have taken actions against single-use plastics on their campus, including the entire University of California system, Iowa State, Purdue, Colorado College, Emory, UMD. Etc. ALMOST THREE QUARTERS (74%) OF THE 14,148 RESPONDENTS TO THE PRINCETON REVIEW'S 2022 COLLEGE HOPES & WORRIES SURVEY INDICATED THAT "HAVING INFORMATION ABOUT A COLLEGE'S COMMITMENT TO THE ENVIRONMENT WOULD CONTRIBUTE TO THEIR DECISION TO APPLY TO OR ATTEND THE SCHOOL."

UTD has achieved STARS (Sustainability Tracking, Assessment & Rating System) Gold status from the Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education's (AASHE)

Noteworthy achievements

• UTD now has 1.28 million square feet of **LEED certified space** across 8 certified buildings, over 10 acres of pollinator habitat, 8,000 trees, and 3 monarch waystations.

• UTD obtained Bicycle Friendly University certification, Bee Campus USA certification and Tree Campus USA certification.

• UTD runs the **Comet Composting** program which provides students, faculty and staff the opportunity to compost on campus. The community has composted over 600,000 lbs. of food waste.

* UTD operates a **single-stream recycling program**; cardboard, paper, aluminum cans, metal cans, plastics (1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 7) and unbroken glass bottles can be placed in all campus recycling bins.

• UTD and UT Arlington collaborate to lead **RCE North Texas**, a Regional Centre for Expertise on Education for Sustainable Development that is part of a global network coordinated by the United Nations.

A STRATEGIC PRIORITY

The UTD Strategic Plan Theme #9 states to "Ensure a sustainable, rewarding campus environment" The newest edition of the UTD Sustainability Policy (UTDBP3013) also clearly outlines similar priorities, including but not limited to "Procurement" and "Materials and Resource Management."



PLAN's Mission

The Post-Landfill Action Network supports students in reimagining systems beyond the Linear Consumption Economy. We equip students with the resources and tools necessary to holistically understand the Global Waste Crisis and lead solutions on their campuses. Collectively, we can build a world beyond waste.

Post-Landfill Action Network

PLAN's framework provides accountability while still allowing for flexibility with timelines. Additionally, PLAN provides resources to assist in implementation, and offers continuous guidance as the ban begins to go into effect. Through the Post Landfill Action Network, UTD could become a leader for other schools pursuing a framework developed by nationally established framework pollution experts.

WHICH PLASTICS?

Single-use disposables such as

- shopping bags
- utensils, bowls, to-go containers, cups
- straws
- plastic water bottles
- beverages in plastic bottles

PLAN proposes a 4-step approach to phasing out Single-Use plastics:

- Develop a Plastic-Free or Zero-Waste Task Force including students, staff, faculty from appropriate departments, and administration, which will develop a roadmap to a plastics free campus.
- Immediately eliminate all non-essential, noncompostable, single-use disposable plastics with readily available alternatives (see Appendix B for a list of suggested items and term definitions)
- Establish a procurement and/or purchasing policy that provides the framework for the long-term elimination of all non-essential, non-compostable, single-use disposable plastics – encompassing both items provided by the institution and those provided by contracted food vendors.
- Implement campus-wide systems that facilitates the proper collection and management of the non-disposable products from step 3.

Accessibility: It is essential that the introduction of any plastic reduction policy at UT Dallas include exceptions for auxiliary aids. The Office of Accessibility should be included on the Plastic Free Task Force and in all conversations with stakeholders for the execution of the policy. Plastic alternatives, such as plastic straws and plastic bags, should be offered at all distribution locations, such as dining locations. These should be offered upon request with no stigma attached.
